If we have humility can we be successful? If you are confident will you be seen as weak instead of humble? Is humility tied to gender roles and what do we do about that? If we admit our shortcomings do we set ourselves up for criticism? Humility is a tricky aspiration in America. Let’s explore the truth about humility and examine how we want to bring that quality into action in our lives.

This past year, Denise Cawley answered a lifelong calling to become a Unitarian Universalist minister and began seminary at Meadville Lombard. As part of her education, Denise volunteers at Planned Parenthood in the procedure and recovery rooms of the Milwaukee abortion clinic, providing spiritual and emotional support to patients. Beginning July 1, Denise will be our student minister at LCUUC.

Denise is a pivotal player working on diversity, inclusion, intersectionality, marriage equality and voting rights in Milwaukee and Door County, Wisconsin. She has led nationally acclaimed campaigns addressing access to voting, visibility of LGBTQ families and was integral in filling the plaintiff class for marriage equality in Wisconsin. Denise’s first career as marketing and public relations professional married her love of visual arts and communication. Additionally, Denise enjoys teaching diversity and inclusion techniques to organizations, assisting them to identify and articulate the organization’s soul and how they express that to the world.

Denise, her wife Anne and son Aidan have attended First Unitarian Society of Milwaukee for over a decade.

New Sanctuary: Protecting Our Most Vulnerable –Led by the Social Justice Committee

Although built as a nation of immigrants, the United States has a certain ambivalence about those not born on American soil. Some are welcomed; others are shunned. And still others are targeted for harassment and deportation. The New Sanctuary Movement is a faith-based component of Voces de La Frontera, which organizes immigrant and allied faith communities to create the conditions necessary for achieving just and humane treatment of immigrants in the U.S. Members of the Movement will share its background, personal stories of how our current immigration system affects real people and offer ways individuals can become directly involved to bring change.

“Resurrection – the Least of the Plausible Possibilities – and Yet!” –The Reverend Andrew C. Kennedy

If we don’t really believe in the resurrection of Jesus, then why should we pay any attention to Easter? Good question. Why indeed? We could easily skip this Easter exercise, but it is ripe with rich possibilities. Please join us as we wrestle with Jesus and his resurrection.

The Reverend Drew Kennedy has served in the Unitarian Universalist ministry for more than 40 years. Drew is now retired and serves as the Minister Emeritus downtown at the First Unitarian Society of Milwaukee.

With degrees in philosophy and ministry, Drew has been honored by the Wisconsin ACLU, the Unitarian Universalist Association, and Meadville Lombard Theological School. He has been interviewed by National Public Radio, Wisconsin Public Radio, and ABC World News Report.

Drew has also twice been arrested for civil disobedience, but central to his ministry has always been his Sunday morning “Reflections.” Please join us as we think about the age-old story of Easter.

Another leap of faith: LCUUC CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

LCUUC must raise \$750,000 to meet our Capital Campaign priorities. Our church home needs some urgent and major repairs and some updates to the interior. The project will begin with the siding and the heating plant as they are most urgent. The capital campaign working group has been working hard to define the scope and establish the priorities for other areas that need to be addressed, knowing that a capital campaign is not a regular occurrence. This is an exciting and major undertaking and one which will enhance our church home and create a space which reflects our LCUUC values.

So far about half of the congregation has pledged their support meeting almost half of our goal. It would be great to have the support of all our members.

If you have any questions or concerns that need to be answered before committing your pledge, please contact one of the committee members so these can be addressed. Your questions would undoubtedly be the same as other people, so it would show need for further communication. Some questions we have received are: "I need more detail," or "this is too much money," or "I hadn't heard anything about this." You also may be able to have your questions answered by visiting the capital campaign website [HERE](#).

As a reminder the pledge itself is the "promise," and that the actual payment options can be over three years (although by May 2018 is preferred). Be assured that pledges go into the lockbox and are kept confidential.

It's important to get the pledges in, as vendors are quoting the various parts of the project right now, and we need to know how much we can fund. If you're not going to be at church soon, I've attached the pledge card can be downloaded from the LCUUC website and can be sent to admin@lcuuc.org instead of putting it in the lockbox. For actual payment method, the options are the same as with the stewardship pledge (website online or check).







MINISTRY FOR EARTH

This is the environmental outreach group for our church. This month we will be hosting another video this one on the Future of Food as it relates to climate change, on Sunday March 25 at 6:30 p.m. There is no charge – just show up.

Our next Ministry for Earth committee meeting is tentatively scheduled for March 25 at 5 p.m. (before the video. Please plan to come to this if you are interested in learning more about activities and opportunities.

We LCUUCers started the Garden for Good not long after we moved in on our Hartland location in 2006. Rob Frost brought his Diesel roto-tiller and tilled up the thick sod, then we built the deer-proof fence "on the cheap" with chicken wire, re-bars, and (mostly) scrap lumber. The garden was very productive with great soil and sun, and we had lots of participation from LCUUC members and from the surrounding community. Veggies were delivered to the Hope Center almost weekly for their outreach meals.

But interest has tailed off, with no activity this past season, so the Garden is in need of a lot of TLC. **Are you interested in bringing the Garden back to life?** There are several options on how to utilize the Garden: produce food for the Hope Center and local food pantries again, open it for individual garden plots, plant it with berry bushes, or ??? Lots of possibilities.




SOCIAL JUSTICE

Thanks so much for supporting your social justice committee in making the Reggie Jackson talk Building Racial Understanding a great success! We had about 175 folks attend the talk at Kettle Moraine High School, most from beyond our congregation. His talk was well received and brought new understanding on the history of segregation in the Milwaukee area as well as steps we can take as individuals to be more welcoming and resist racial bias. This talk was in addition to meeting with all the students at Kettle Moraine High School, and was followed up with him speaking at University Lake School. Other area high schools are reaching out to Reggie to do programs of their own. Perhaps in the big picture these are small steps, but they get the ball rolling and hopefully we can keep momentum building.

Here are the easy steps Reggie taught us for Building Racial Understanding:

- Get out of your bubble.
- Pay attention to your habits.
- Become aware of biased behavior
- Replace your automatic judgments of others
- Develop a strong desire and motivation to seek change
- Create a strategy to build your own personal understanding of others
- Study alternative resources written by people from other groups that you are not familiar with.



Thanks to all who participated in the “Examining Whiteness” class, where we had good conversations as we explored the history of White Supremacy in the US, white power and privilege, racial identity and how we can become anti-racist. There’s much more to do in this area. Thanks to Betsy Foss–Campbell for coordinating this class.

The Social Justice Committee encourages you to see the Milwaukee Rep’s production of *“Until the Flood”* – which is about the racial events in Ferguson, Missouri. Join us for a group outing there on March 17 at 4pm at a reduced cost of \$33. The Zeidler Center will be leading facilitated discussions on the play after the performance, and our own Phil Smith will be leading one of them. Exciting new fundraising initiative!

RETHINKING RUMMAGE SALES

Are you decluttering? Spring Cleaning? Downsizing? The LCUUC Fundraising committee wants your treasures!!!

This year, instead of a rummage sale, we will be selling donated items online using eBay, Craigslist, etc. We hope this will allow us to bring in funds from a wider circle and allows you to donate year-round. However, the type of items that sell online is sometimes different than what sells at a rummage sale. We will send you a list for what we are looking for and what we don't want. Items should be clean and in good condition-think consignment store quality more than garages sale. We plan to start small and build as we see how it goes. We also need volunteers to make this work. Here are some answers to possible questions...

How Will it Work?

Bring your items to church. A committee member will look through what you have and take just what we think we can sell. You bring home the rest to donate or keep. Some items will be sold on eBay and shipped. Bigger items will be sold on more local platforms with pick-ups at church. Most items will not be stored at church.

How Can I Help?

We need volunteers in the following roles to make this work. We will train you and you don't need to be on the fundraising committee to be part of this effort

1. Sorting through donated items on Sundays
2. Selling items on eBay
3. Selling items on craigslist or other local platforms (possibly FaceBook marketplace)
4. Completing sale of items (mostly at church with another person for safety)

Can I Get My Item Back if It Doesn't Sell?

For the most part, no. We are trying to streamline the process and logging the seller for each item and contacting everyone would make the process a lot more time-intensive. However, for items of high value or on a case-by-case basis we could likely do this

Do I Have to Bring My Big Items to Church?

Not right away. If you have a kayak or bike or piece of furniture, simply take a good picture and email it to Kristin at kmksanden@gmail.com. We can talk to you about your transport/pick up preferences before we post the picture.

Can I Get a Receipt?

Yes! We plan to provide a blank receipt upon request for you to complete with your donations and value

What if I Have an Item to Sell that Isn't on the List?

Talk to one of us. It was hard to capture all possible items and there can be exceptions to every category. Some items we may decide to try selling in the future as we see how it goes.

Can I Sell Items on My Own and Donate the Money?

Of course! Some items may work better this way. Or you may wish to donate just a percentage of the sale to LCUUC. Let us know if you are doing this so we can make sure we are tracking our fundraising earnings

What if I am Looking to Buy? How Can I See What Others Are Selling?

We will have a few items each week on display on a table at church with instructions on how to purchase. We will also look at putting links/photos on our website. We are still considering the best way to do this

ON BOARD

This past February's Board meeting once again had a full agenda in order to update the board members on the ongoing business of our church here at Lake Country Unitarian Universalist Church. Before we start to move into our budgeting process for our next church financial year, we are keeping a close tab on how we are doing financially as a church. Tim Fuller, a long time member, has volunteered to be Treasurer here at LCUUC.

With support from our office staff and the finance committee's work, the information is generated to help provide board members with the numbers to make our decisions on church business and budgeting. As you can imagine, this time of year for households and LCUUC, there is plenty to do for a growing congregation like ours. Our board appreciates the patience of the congregation as we transition into this new year.

The budgeting process for the upcoming church year, will begin in April for the board, and all the committees at LCUUC will be submitting their requests to the board for approval. Reminder, there has been and probably still is an organizational chart for LCUUC posted in the hallway leading into the social hall from the main entrance of the church. Take a look and see where you might currently be or could fit into helping us.

The Capital Campaign fund is coming along. At each service, we have heard from a member of the congregation. The committee has been working on getting the information out to the congregation. These past few months, pledges of current and future contributions have been coming in.

There are a number of aspects to this project. Financial and physical concerns for the building here that houses us as we do the worship, business and play of LCUUC are involved. There is information posted in the social hall about the physical things we need to do with the building to keep it going. Stewardship is ongoing at LCUUC and there are 2 or 3 meetings left to be held with congregation members. If you have not attended one, please contact our Stewardship committee. With some idea of future expectations of finances, the committees and board can work to plan our church year accordingly.

Childrens Religious Education report was presented. Chris Rollins, Director here at LCUUC gives frequent updates in the newsletters about ongoing and upcoming activities. The committee and DRE have been working on curriculum in place for all grade levels utilizing Tapestry of Faith from the UUA. This involves mapping of lessons for a three year cycle.

In January, Erich Moraine presented information to the board on the Sangha held here at LCUUC.

In personnel issues, a detailed job description was presented to the board for the position of Church Administrator. This is a brief summary of our Board of Trustees Meeting from Tuesday Feb. 20, 2018. There is so much ongoing at LCUUC. As a board member, I work to keep informed, ask questions, participate and help out where I choose and can, in the church that I have been with for almost 20 years. I would like take this opportunity to say thank you to past and new members for helping me on this journey!


